

TO THE AIRCREWS

This is the time of year when you start to get frost on the aircraft. Every year, AASF #2 looses thousands of dollars in parts money and hundreds of man-hours due to replacement of plexiglas windscreens which are scratched when people try to remove frost from them.

The ONLY way to rmove frost from windscreens, as far as this facility is concerned, is to use <u>WARM AIR</u>, either from the aircraft heaters or from the portable Herman Nelson Heaters. When using the Herman Nelson Heater, be sure not to let the air get too hot, as it will warp or even melt the plexiglas. The pilot side windscreen on an OH-58, costs \$550, while the left side windscreen costs \$450. It also takes thirty-five man-hours to replace both sides.

Please be careful. If you see aircrews defrosting aircraft improperly, tell them about it. And remember, <u>NEVER</u> leave a Herman Nelson Heater running unattended.



TO ALL POTENTIAL AERO SCOUT OBSERVERS

Take Notice: At the present time there are no available slots open. But, to become a Scout you must first be in aircraft maintenance for at least a year, probably longer. Upon arriving in the Maintenance Section you should notify your platoon sergeant of your desire to become an Aero Scout Observer. You will then be put on a list. This list is a seniority list. If you want added to this list, please be patient. Pretty females won't need much patience, they are automatically on top of the list. Just kidding. First come-first serve.


SPECIAL RECOGNITION

SERVICE PLATOON
